


1.	The Cottage	ETA	12:00
A large single room pub with a lovely enclosed patio garden at the rear. Refurbished in 2015 by Grain Brewery to a very high standard, with solid oak flooring, wood paneling, exposed brickwork and a copper bar-top. Six handpumps, usually all from Grain but including the occasional special guest, plus a selection of quality spirits and craft beers.			
2.	The Leopard	ETA	13:00
Bright and clean single-bar corner local, serving several local ales. The tiny bar installed by the previous owner has been removed, and a long bar installed where it used to be along one wall, giving plenty of space for handpumps, and the interior has been completely refurbished to a very high standard.			
3.	Plasterers Arms	ETA	14:00
This is a friendly corner local with a wide range of microbrewery beers from around the country, specialising in new and exciting breweries. A variety of craft keg beers from near and far are also available, alongside a great range of bottled and canned beer. Regular tap takeovers and meet the brewer events are held.			
4.	Kings Head	ETA	15:00
A traditional two-bar city pub which has been a mandatory stop on the Norwich real ale trail since 2005, with its 14 handpumps, mostly serving beers from Norfolk, plus a few selected guests such as Three Blind Mice, Green Jack, Derby Brewing and Newby Wyke. There is also local cider and perry, plus a large range of bottled European beers, but no keg beers at all.			
5.	Ribs of Beef	ETA	16:00
Traditional and well-decorated pub overlooking the River Wensum with a delightful - if small! - riverside terrace with views of the ancient Fye Bridge.			
6.	Glasshouse	ETA	17:00
Large pub in the old centre of the city, with excellent views of the Cathedral from the multi-level shaded and planted terrace at the rear. Converted from an old glass factory which was obviously made up of various separate buildings, there are several small drinking areas on the ground floor, with a staircase and balcony in the largest.			
7.	Louis Marchesi	ETA	18:00
Four real ales are always available in this Grade II-listed building, which dates in parts from the 15th century. Located opposite the 11C cathedral in the oldest part of the city, there's a continental feel to the busy bar. Quality home-cooked food is available lunch and evening, and all day Saturday, all sourced locally, and including excellent vegetarian options.			
8.	Wig & Pen	ETA	19:00
Friendly local-in-the-city public house, with six beers available, that has built up a reputation both for its ales and good value quality food. The 17C building has plenty of beams and exposed brickwork.			
9.	Adam and Eve	ETA	20:00
Secluded Dutch-gabled pub which claims to be the oldest in Norwich (parts date from 1249). The tiny low-ceilinged oak-beamed bar is supplemented by a snug, and a separate bar usually reserved for parties.			
10.	Red lion	ETA	21:00
An attractive riverside pub situated at the end of the oldest bridge in Norwich. It is in easy reach of the railway station and buses, and is convenient for pleasure boats using the nearby moorings.
